Chairperson's Report

In 2017 the Māori Education Trust focused on increasing assistance to students, improving students' ability to apply for and access assistance, and on the Trust's ability to manage and process scholarship applications. This single-minded focus on improving the service we provide for students was made possible by increasing income, lower costs and the ability of the Board and staff to devote more time to its core role. The Board expects to continue this work in 2018 and realize further gains from the hard work of our staff this year.

The Board would also like to thank the stakeholders who provided support during this difficult period, particularly the Ministry of Education, which never lost sight of the Trust's kaupapa. We thank Ministry staff Helena Fagan, Rawiri Brell and Apryll Parata for their focus on assistance to Māori students and the beneficiaries of the Trust.

The Māori Education Trust

The Trust is the successor to the Māori Education Foundation, established in 1961 to assist with the education of Māori. Until 1993, when the Trust was formed, the Foundation was managed by the Ministry of Education.

Since its formation in 1961, the Foundation and the Trust have provided a total of \$59m in assistance to more than 76,500 students.

The income for the Trust comes from three sources: the Trust's own investments, capital trusts in which donors have provided capital sums to endow scholarships and income trusts in which the Trust receives the income from a trust established by a donor. This income is matched dollar for dollar by the Ministry of Education, an arrangement started when the Foundation was formed in 1961. The current annual cap on this matching funding is \$664,000. The Trust also receives an administration grant from the Ministry to assist with the delivery of scholarships.

The Trust is governed by a Board made up of community representatives and representatives of stakeholder groups, Te Roopu Wahine Maori Toko i te Ora (the Maori Women's Welfare League), Te Kaunihera Māori o Aotearoa (the New Zealand Māori Council) and Te Kohanga Reo National Trust. The Chairperson, Monita Delamere, is a Chartered Accountant. Other Board members are Dame Iritana Tawhiwhirangi, Bronwyn Yates, Prue Kapua and Bayden Barber. The Trust has two employees.

Board Members

Chairperson, Monita Delamere (Te Whanau a Apanui, Te Whakatohea and Ngai Tahu). Monita was Co-Chair with Bronwyn Yates until 4 Whiringa-ā-rangi (November) 2016. He is a Chartered Accountant with wide experience in public practise and the corporate world and also has deep experience in governance roles in education. In 1962 he was the recipient of a grant from the Māori Education Foundation to help with his accountancy studies. No reira, ngā mihi ki a rātou ngā tīpuna i whakatō te kākano o tenei roopu.

Dame Iritana Tawhiwhirangi (Ngāti Porou, Ngāti Kahungunu and Ngāpuhi), MBE and DNZM. Dame Iritana is a founder of the Kohanga Reo movement and is also a board member of the National Kohanga Reo Trust.

Bronwyn Yates (Rongowhakaata, Te Aitanga ā-Māhaki, Te Arawa and Ngāti Maniapoto), QSM. Bronwyn was Co-Chair up to 4 Whiringa-ā-rangi (November) 2016. Bronwyn has been Te Tumuaki (Chief Executive Officer) of Literacy Aotearoa since 2005, a Treaty based organisation that is the largest national network of adult literacy providers in New Zealand.

Prue Kapua (Ngāti Whakaeu, Te Arawa and Ngāti Kahungunu), National President of Te Roopu Wahine Maori Toko i te Ora (the Maori Women's Welfare League) is a highly experienced lawyer with expertise in resource management law, Treaty issues and litigation, family and medico legal-issues.

Bayden Barber (Ngāti Kahungunu, Ngāpuhi and Ngai Tahu), is a business consultant, Chairman of the Waimarama Māori Committee and an elected member of the Hastings District Council.

Assistance to students 2017

In 2017, the Trust provided assistance totalling \$1.186m to more than 680 students. The increase was in the number of discretionary secondary and tertiary scholarships the Trust provided.

The largest number of scholarships were awarded to those undertaking undergraduate study (382) followed by those in their first year of secondary school (227) and lastly those committed to post graduate study (74).

Secondary school assistance is awarded based on academic record and financial need and goes to help meet the costs of textbooks or uniforms (\$500) or boarding school fees (\$1,000). Undergraduates can receive between \$500 and \$10,000 in a year with preference for those in their final year or second to last year of their degree. Postgraduate students receive between \$5,000 and \$30,000. Most of the assistance for undergraduate and postgraduates is for specific fields of study.

The Trust's assistance to students is funded from the following sources: scholarship income, capital trusts and the Ministry of Education subsidy. The funds available to the Trust from the income and capital trusts that support the scholarships noted in the Chairperson's report can vary from year to year and affect the number of scholarships awarded.

Making progress

The work of the Trust is guided by an action plan that covers the next five years which is reviewed annually.

The two most important areas on which the Trust concentrated in the last year were:

Investment strategy – In 2017 the Trust has begun to explore its investment options for its own funds, its investment capital. The Trust's net assets now stand at \$9.3m. The Trust is taking expert advice and we expect that our investment endowment will provide a higher and less variable income than the endowed farms once did. This will enable the Trust to provide more assistance to students over time. We will provide further detail on the investment strategy we adopt in the 2018 annual report.



Website development – the Trust has commissioned a four stage development of its website to make it easier for students to access and apply for assistance. The project will also make it easier for the Trust to manage the application and approval process for students. The project is being carried out in four stages to ensure each stage is completed to the Trust’s satisfaction before the next stage begins and to contain costs over the life of the project.

We expect both our investment strategy and the new website will be implemented in the 2018 financial year.

During the last year we have worked on a number of other projects to improve the ability of the Trust to carry out its core tasks. These include:

- Completion of a review of the Trust Deed.
- Completion of our audited accounts for the 2016 financial year.
- Relocation to office premises in Lower Hutt.

In the next year we also expect to make progress on other matters, including:

- Meeting key stakeholders to inform them of the work undertaken and the Trust’s future objectives for growth and development.
- Developing a closer understanding of the needs of Māori students so that this information can shape the type of assistance we provide and in which areas.
- Assessing how we can use our upgraded scholarship administrative capacity to manage scholarships for other organisations, including iwi.

Financial Results

The 2017 financial results for the Trust show steady progress by the Board in moving to greater financial stability and certainty. The Trust’s net assets were almost unchanged from the previous year at \$9.3m, with investments at \$7.5m and cash of just over \$1m.



2017 Māori Education Trust Scholarship Recipients

Financial assistance is a necessity for many secondary and tertiary students; scholarships have a genuine impact on a student's ability to undertake study, removing financial barriers to learning which enables them to focus on their studies.

The 2017 scholarship round opened Whiringa-ā-rangi (November) 2016; the secondary round closed 24 Hui-tanguru (February) 2017 and the tertiary round closed 31 Poutū-te-rangi (March) 2017. Recipients were selected according to specific scholarship criteria.

I would like to express my thanks and gratitude to Maori Education Trust for being named a recipient of the R J Graham Scholarship 2017.

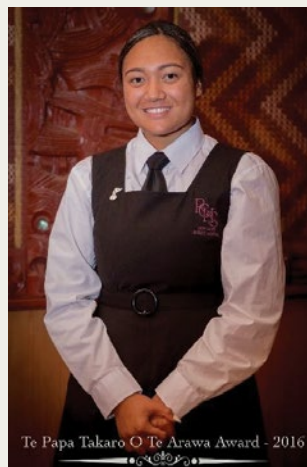

(1) Prior Period Adjustments

The Trust has reviewed its accounting treatment adopted for capital trust funds received in past periods. These funds have been gifted to the Trust with restrictions attached to maintain the capital balance and to utilise the revenue from the funds for specific scholarships.

Historically these funds have been treated as liabilities and any income and the associated scholarships awarded have been accounted for directly in the statement of financial position. Following a review of PBE IPSAS 23 Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions and PBE IFRS 47 First Time Adoption of PBE standards it has been concluded that they should have been treated as equity on the transition to PBE IPSAS as the gifts did not contain any conditions that the gifts must be returned to the donors.

The opening statement of financial position as at 1 July 2015 has been restated to increase equity and reduce liabilities by \$1,878,482. The 2016 statement of comprehensive revenue has been restated to recognise interest income of \$59,172 allocated directly to the capital trusts funds. As there were no scholarships awarded from the capital trusts funds reserves in 2016 no adjustments for scholarships are required.

Following an audit by the Inland Revenue department a GST receivable from prior years of \$33,345 has been reversed as it is not able to be claimed. The opening accumulated surplus has been restated to reduce opening equity by \$33,345. The 2016 GST receivable has been reduced by this amount.

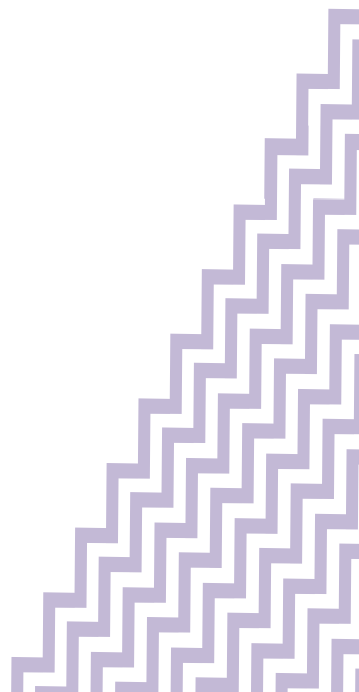


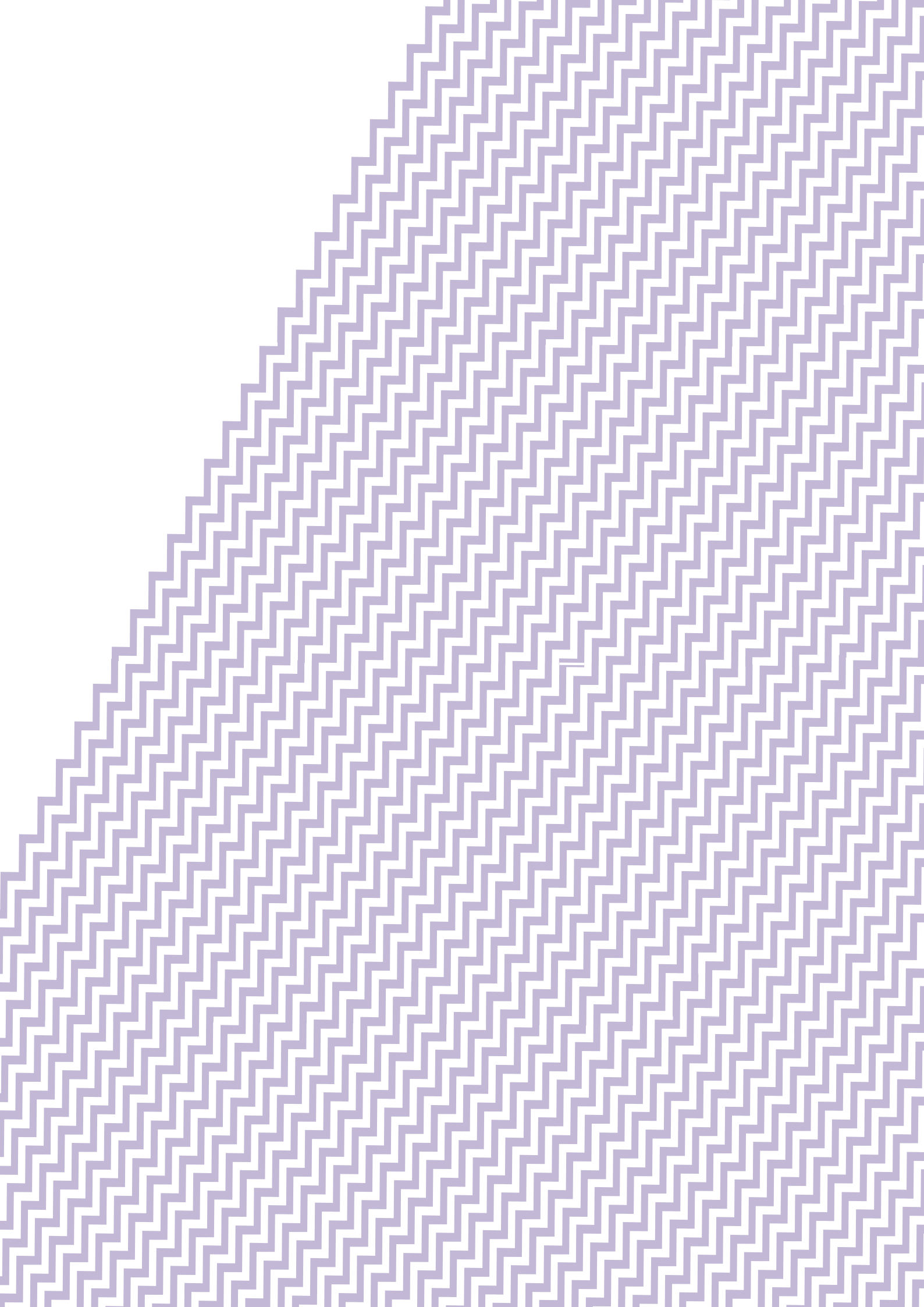
Related Party Disclosures

The Māori Education Trust purchased services totalling \$2,100 (2016 \$5,470) from ME Delamere, a trustee for the Māori Education Trust. Mr Delamere is a Chartered Accountant and was contracted to assist with the preparation of the end of financial statements.

ME Delamere is accountant and B Yates is Te Tumuaki (CEO) for Literacy Aotearoa Inc from which MET has purchased accounting services totalling \$15,000 (2016 \$15,000).
